Senior Current Issues - Syllabus Guidelines for Mr. Wood's 2016/17 Senior Current Issues Course

This course provides a three fold concentration for graduating seniors. #I we survey cultures, societies, and geographical regions of the world. In the process we will look closely at the continent of Africa. Teams of two will research the history of one African nation for a semester, and follow it in regards to the current news and take on specific assignments that will broaden their awareness of the country and the continent. These groups will share their knowledge with the rest of the class.

A second focus of the course will be to study current domestic and international events in the news. Since these events are by their very nature "Current Issues" we have the luxury in our studies to choose incidents that are current, and at the same time compelling. Consequently, we (you and I together) have the opportunity to shape the curriculum. We will supplement our studies with independent film, documentaries, and assigned readings to help students better appreciate the diversity of world cultures and immediacy of current events. Special note: some of the movies will be R-rated and controversial by their subject selection; they will however remain pertinent to our focus of study and consequently useful for learning. Parent permission will be secured before watching such movies.

2016 is an Election Year. We will follow the presidential election. How far we go here will depend upon what the class wants to do with this. We have the luxury of time and direction in this course and will decide together the depth of our coverage of the Election.

Finally and maybe most significantly, in Part III, students will be asked to look at their life after high school. The major focus here will be to concentrate on searching for colleges, apprenticeships, and scholarships. Students will be encouraged to organize themselves in all aspects of post high school education. We will set up college visits and spend a substantial amount of class time working on scholarship searches. We also lay out five and ten year plan goals in an effort to help seniors leave Oakridge on a positive footing.

By looking within and setting short and long term goals, and by taking an in-depth view at the world around us, it is my hope that this course will help to prepare Oakridge Students for success in an interdependent global society.

HOMEWORK -33%

Homework assignments will vary in Senior Current Issues between the study of individual events as well as ongoing issues. Some of these topics will be a short study; others will deal with in-depth longer term issues The main criteria for determining whether your assignment will be categorized for grading purposes as a "Project" or "Homework" will be the amount of time dedicated to that topic. Any topic that is addressed, discussed, and provided homework assignments for within a one week time window - will be classified for grading purposes as "Homework." Continuing long-term assignments will fall under "Projects."

QUIZZES & TESTS - 33%

Pop quizzes on topics for discussion are always fair game in a Current Events class. The focus of quizzes and tests in this course will revolve around the changing subject area of "Current Events." Larger tests which will be more identified with "Projects", may serve as a test grade and /or a Common Assessment. You will be informed ahead of time in which category specific tests fall for grading purposes.

PROJECTS - 33%

For each semester we will work on two major projects. Semester I will include a "Travel the World with SCI" Assignment in which you'll be challenged to look at the world from a personal travel perspective. You'll have the opportunity to plan a three week road trip to anywhere in the world. We will research everything from flight to hotels to daily explorations. Hopefully this will inspire you to dig deeper into the world and explore on your own. Semester II will include a semester long study on "Exploring Africa." College Scholarship searches qualify for Project status as well. Other projects may surface from time to time, depending on your interest and my evolving plans. In 2016 "The Election" could be one of those projects.

SSR - Is now a required part of all first hour courses

The Oakridge High School staff has chosen to incorporate twenty minutes of sustained silent reading into every first hour classroom. The goal is to improve reading comprehension across the curriculum. While we will participate in this experiment, we will do so from a current events perspective. Twenty minutes a day are set aside for your reading pleasure - your choice of text. Three days a week we will focus that choice.

The Q/A session, depending on available time, will run for ten or fifteen minutes. By allowing you choice on your reading material, I am trusting that you stay on task on the Chrome books. Please do not take advantage of this trust. Let's make SSR a dynamic experience.

We have the opportunity each year in SCI to shape the curriculum. With that in mind all of the above may change - and you all have the power to change it.
